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FRAMEWORK

Step 1: Online review of the NCI-designated centers' AYA and sexual health resources

Step 2: Literature review of sexual health programs for cancer survivors (including AYAs)


Step 3: Develop potential content and stakeholder interview guide

Step 4: Conduct stakeholder interviews and refine program content

Step 5: Pilot test developed program with patient stakeholders

STEP 1

- GOAL: understand the current landscape of sexual support to help shape our intervention materials
- HOW: conduct search of A. care centers and B. comprehensive care centers designated by the NCI in the same way a patient might navigate a website and code according to the design below



STEP 2:

- GOAL: understand scope of current sexual health programs that can inform our own
- HOW: conduct a literature review using the Covidence platform to screen for sexual health programs for cancer survivors

Cancer and cancer treatments can cause a significant impact on *sexual health and well-being*

- Sexual health concerns are particularly important at *the stage of life for AYA patients* (15-39 years old)
- Female AYA cancer survivors report *largely unmet* sexual health *education* and *support* needs



STEP 3

- GOAL: create a semi-structured interview guide for individual interviews with female AYA cancer survivors
- HOW: 6-part interview, lasting 30-60 minutes



STEP 4

WHERE WE ARE NOW!

- GOAL: obtain information regarding sexual health concerns young female patients experience and gain feedback on educational program development to help inform our design
- HOW: interview patient stakeholders (N = 5) via Zoom using the Patient Interview Guide developed in Step 3

MOVING FORWARD

STEP 5

- GOAL: pilot test our developed program with patient stakeholders
 (N = 5)
- HOW: implement program with patients who participated in our stakeholder interviews from Step 4 to assess our intervention program
